Dean Collection Donated to Museum

As briefly mentioned in the July issue of the Historigram, the lives of Dr. George Adgate Dean (1904–1970) and his wife Louise Griswold Dean (1905–1995) are wonderfully represented in a significant collection of documents, photographs and other items recently donated by the family to the Perinton Historical Society.

Each selflessly served their adopted hometown, the Fairport-Perinton community, in many capacities. Both were also active in the Perinton Historical Society as members of the PHS Executive Committee.

After completing medical school and an internship at a Rochester hospital, the 26 year-old Doctor Dean chose to set up his first practice in the "country village" of Fairport in the summer of 1930.

He and his Cornell sweetheart, "Louie" Griswold, married the following year. Together they administered care and affection to countless citizens and neighbors in the community, much of which is chronicled in letters and essays, all part of the collection.

Comments from your President

August 13, 2018:

I'm writing this month's article again from my office in the carriage barn on another hot muggy day. Hasn't this summer been a scorcher? The newspaper's weather page bears this out, when you look at the "cooling degree days" for the

year. As I have mentioned in previous columns, a cooling degree day is an index of energy consumption indicating how many degrees the average temperature is above 65 degrees for the day. As of August 11th we have had an index of 648, with 381 being normal and 437 at the same time last year. Another statistic that lets one know it has been hot are the number of days the temperature has been 90 or above. As I write this, our total is 17 days, according to data recorded at the airport. This includes one day in May, three in June, eleven in July, and two so far in August.

This hot, muggy weather has dictated our bike riding times, as we try to beat the heat by riding earlier in the day. We have ridden about 550 miles for the year, which is approximately average for us, according to Cindy's diary. Cindy has kept a diary since 1974 and we refer to them often when trying to remember events of the past. They are very useful and at times, entertaining reading.

This year I have been trying to identify the many different wild flowers observed while we ride. To date 51 different ones have been identified with probably 50 more observed, but not identified. For the 50 unknowns, I would have to stop and look at the flower up close with my "Audubon Society Field Guide to North American Wildflowers.' I will work on this on future rides.

In the spring one of the first flowers we see, particularly along the canal path, are thousands of honeysuckle bushes, with their white, pink or red blossoms. These flowers are very fragrant as well so a couple of our senses are stimulated; sight and smell. As we ride past these honeysuckle bushes now, they are covered with red or orange berries.

Starting a few weeks back, around the middle of July, the Black-Eyed Susans were in bloom. From Waynesport Road to Canandaigua Road, between the canal path and the railroad, there were several large patches with thousands of flowers each, in full bloom. Vitamin N (Nature) at its best. One of our favorite wild flowers is chicory with its beautiful periwinkle blue blossom. We have only seen a few flower heads open at a time, and they only last for a day, with new buds opening the next day. This Old World weed is sometimes sought for its food use, as the roots can be roasted

and ground as a coffee substitute or additive.

Another favorite, especially when the grandkids were younger, is Queen Ann's lace or wild carrot. Up close, it smells like carrots. And when picked and placed in a glass of color-dyed water, the plant absorbs the color. Soon you will have the laces in red, blue, green or whatever color dye you decide to use. What fun for young children and for us old goats as well.

So far, the house sparrows nesting in the side of the carriage barn have produced two families of future house sparrows. This is why we see so many sparrows around the feeders.

At the museum you will notice a couple of new benches brightly painted and the hedges and trees neatly edged and mulched. This was an Eagle Scout project completed the first week of August. The museum and grounds are looking great, so be sure to stop by and enjoy.

Thanks for your continued support, it is appreciated. We will chat again in our next issue.



The Legacy of Lillian Wald

The story of Lillian
Wald describes a life
of activism, dedication, and
accomplishment. She was a
nurse, teacher, social worker,
author, suffragist, child

advocate, trade unionist and immigrant rights leader—in every aspect of her life, she was a pioneer. Lillian founded the Visiting Nurse Service of New York and the Henry Street Settlement in New York City. She considered Rochester her home and is buried with her family in Mount Hope Cemetery. She was a prolific writer, and her words hold special significance in today's world. You will be inspired by a woman recognized during her life as one of the greatest living women of her time.

Presenter Patricia Corcoran is a graduate of LeMoyne College and earned a master's degree from SUNY Brockport. After teaching two years in Corning, she went to Turkey in the Peace Corps and taught English in a public school for gifted children. After Turkey, Pat arrived in Rochester and began her 30-year career as an ESOL teacher in the Rochester City School District. Following her retirement, Pat was the acting director of the graduate TESOL program at Nazareth College and an adjunct instructor at SUNY Geneseo, St. John Fisher College, and Nazareth College. She is currently vice president of the Friends of Mount Hope and is a tour guide.


