The Famous DeLand Band

Predecessor to the Fairport Fire Department Band

In 1879, Joseph Duncan, who operated Duncan's Palace Meat Market at the corner of Fairport's High and North Main Streets, started the groundwork for the funding of Fairport's first serious community band. Serving as president of the village, he no doubt used considerable influence to get the contributions rolling in.

Less than a year later, on October 8, 1880, the *Fairport Herald* newspaper published the following:

"This was in a letter to the newspaper from William Alcorn, President and Secretary of the Fairport Cornet Band, thanking the community residents for their generosity in contributing money for new band instruments. The members of the Fairport Cornet Band desire to thank their friends for their generous response to the application of the band for assistance in the purchase of new instruments."

Soon after, in 1881, Robert Wignall, Sr., took over the task and formally organized the L.J. DeLand Band at the request of Levi DeLand, who owned the DeLand Chemical Works. Mr. DeLand had also founded the DeLand Hose Company—the first fire department in Fairport. Thus Fairport's first "fire department" band was unofficially born.

Major credit to the early success of the band went to Robert Wignall, who was its director for 22 years. He recruited 20 talented musicians, a few even from as far as New England. Some were given jobs at the DeLand factory where Wignall, who had just moved to Fairport from Palmyra, was a recently hired foreman. He also brought in a tailor from Ohio to measure each musician and sew impressive uniforms for them.

The original name, Fairport Cornet Band, dating to the early 1870s, became the L.J. DeLand Cornet Band and later, in 1896, the DeLand Military Band. The reason for the second name change might have had to do with how other fire

departments in the area were naming their bands about that time. Back then, "Military" seemed to be a more appropriate label than "Cornet." The word "Military" also described the distinctive, patriotic marches being played on the street—many still popular with today's fire department bands.

About that same time, it was reported in one local newspaper that the Fairport Moose Lodge had been a major financial contributor and it was possible that the band would be known as the Fairport Moose Band. Apparently, that proposal did not get very many votes (fortunately).

For many years, the DeLand Band gained fame by winning tournaments across the state. It also gave many concerts and marched in parades, including the Fairport Old Home Week parades in 1908, which according to newspapers, featured more than two dozen marching bands.

Sadly, the DeLand Band eventually marched into the sunset. No records have been found to indicate when the band stopped functioning or if another band took its place on the street.

However, in the late 1940s, the Fairport VFW Band came on the scene, giving concerts and marching in parades for the local fire department. (In 1956, while in high school, I was a member of the VFW Band, playing trumpet in parades and concerts throughout the year.)

In the early 1970s, the VFW Band disbanded and its sheet music was turned over to the fire department to help get the current band started. It's possible that some of the band musicians went along with the transfer of sheet music.



-Fairport FD Band-Continuing the Tradition

Formed back in 1972 by firefighter legend Don Fox, and now in its 50th year, the Fairport Fire Department Band continues the DeLand Band tradition of performing in many parades and concerts, including the annual Salute to America concert at Perinton Center Park, Fairport Gazebo series, Fairport Oktoberfest, and village's Home for the Holidays Festival in December. The band also performs annually on the front lawn of the Fairport Baptist Homes and at other housing facilities for seniors in the area.

Over the years, the band has been recognized as one of the most accomplished marching bands in New York State, achieving the title of NYS Volunteer Fire Department Champions in 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1995, 1998, 2000, 2002, 2004 and 2006.

More recently, instead of the state fire fighters parade, the band has competed in the annual Hudson Valley Fire Fighters Association parade, marching for the city of Ossining Fire Department. Several times, the band has earned Best Musical Unit, defeating as many as 60 creditable contenders.

In 1999, and again in 2006, the band had the honor of marching down Main Street USA at Walt Disney World's Magic Kingdom—at the request of the Disney Company. In 2001, New York Governor George Pataki surprised the crowd by leading the band in Fairport's Independence Day parade.

Through the years, band members have come and gone. But not Lynn Selke (euphonium). He is an original member, joining the band when it formed in 1972. Although Lynn is no longer marching in parades, he is still active in the group, playing his horn in concerts.

Tracing our Roots Along the Erie Canal

A Virtual Presentation

As one of our final Erie Canal Bicentennial celebratory events of 2022, please join us on ZOOM Thursday, October 13th at 7:00 pm as NYS Canal Corporation Senior Director of Public Engagement, Rebecca Hughes, discusses her ancestor's connection to the canal.

When Rebecca Hughes came to work for the Canal Corporation in 2021, a relative mentioned that her great-great-great-grandfather had been a lock tender on the Erie Canal. This small hint sparked a journey of discovery, uncovering the life of Captain Eugene Gorham that might have been otherwise lost to time. Join Rebecca as she describes the sometimes complicated work of discovering our roots along the Erie Canal.

The New York State Canal Corporation is a subsidiary of the New York Power Authority (NYPA). Rebecca's team is responsible for public and government relations across the 524-mile canal system, engaging with a wide range of stakeholders on a broad range of topics. Rebecca strives to build coalitions through open dialogue and transparent communication. She earned a bachelor's degree in politics

from the State University of New York at Potsdam, and graduate certificates in labor law from Empire State College and in strategic marketing from Cornell University.

Digging for nuggets of local history can yield some amazing results, and in this regard, 2022 has been a productive year. Through a combination of research, a growing network of engaged residents and sleuths, and no shortage of dumb luck, a bountiful harvest of local history has presented itself.

And now, Perinton-Fairport historian Bill Poray will present it to you.

Among the stories to be told are a previously unknown local anti-slavery society, a mysterious and surprising collection of burials at a local cemetery, and the discovery of several works of a prominent architect in Fairport.

But that's not all—other stories include the earliest Fairport home of Daniel and Minerva DeLand, in which it has been said they first produced their landmark saleratus product. For good measure, also included will be the recent acquisition of photos of local people and places from well over 100 years ago. Finally, he will report on what just might be a Can Factory ghost story, and the unearthing of teeth as big as bowling balls!

With years of experience behind them, the ROC Diggers have a passion for discovering artifacts from the past. The team seeks locations for their exploration, using maps and records to learn a bit of the specific history of the site. Property owners sometimes contact the ROC Diggers, offering them the opportunity to explore their yards or land. The team then painstakingly utilizes their sophisticated equipment to locate any metal objects under the surface. While some searches are more successful than others, the enjoyment is in the hunt.
